The plan will be our guide for what we - as a community - try to make happen over the next 5 years.

This plan will help us to develop our priority projects and make representation on behalf of the community on the issues that matter most to our residents, organizations and local businesses.

WORKING TOGETHER

The preparation of the plan has been organised by the Community Action Plan Steering
Group which brought together representatives from Ardoch Development Trust, Braco
Church, Braco and Greenloaning Community
Council, Ardoch in Bloom, Braco Primary
Parent Council and other interested local people.
The Steering Group was supported by Bridie Grant, the Ardoch Development Trust
Development Officer and guided in their work by the STAR Development Group. They were assisted by over 30 volunteers who helped with the distribution and collection of the household survey and in organising the community event.

LOCAL PEOPLE HAVE THEIR SAY

The Action Plan has been informed by extensive community engagement carried out over a six-month period from January to June 2023.

The process involved:

- A community views household survey
- A series of stakeholder conversations with community organisations, local businesses, landowners, and local people with different interests in the community
- A children's views survey with pupils from Braco Primary School
- Compiling a community profile of facts and figures about the area
- Organising a community open day event to feedback results and vote for priorities.

Braco and Greenloaning 2023 Summary Profile

LOCATION

The villages of Braco and Greenloaning are conveniently located close to the A9 on the A822 road just 6 miles from Dunblane and 8 miles from Crieff. They are set within attractive countryside - a mix of farmland, woodland, rivers and burns. The Braco and Greenloaning Community Council area extends beyond the villages along the Langside Road to Comrie and up towards Muthill and out towards Auchterarder. It is within the Strathallan Ward of Perth & Kinross Council and close to the boundary with Stirling Council.

POPULATION AND HOUSING

The population of the area is estimated at around 1,200. The age profile has a higher percentage (compared to Perth & Kinross and Scotland) of over 65's and a lower percentage of 16 and under age groups. However, it has a slightly higher percentage of working age population (16-65) than for Perth & Kinross. (National Records of Scotland Estimated Population SIMD 2020)

The local estimate is that there are around 450 houses in the Community Council area.

The housing market is characterised by:

- A high percentage of owner-occupied housing compared to Perth & Kinross and Scotland, with lower levels of social and private rented housing.
- A relatively high proportion of housing in Council Tax bands F-G than in lower priced housing.

Over the last 20 years population growth has been slower than for the rest of Perth &

Kinross. Population growth in the past has been 'in waves' linked to the development of

housing estates in Braco and then Greenloaning.

LOCAL ECONOMY

Economic activity in Braco and Greenloaning is broadly similar to that of Perth & Kinross – but with a significantly higher percentage of self-employed people and a lower percentage of full-time employees.

The location of the community makes it a good place for commuting. Over 20% of the working population work in health, social work and education - the retail sector is the second largest source of employment. Locally within the area the largest number of businesses are involved in land-based activities. Construction, professional, scientific, and technical activities, retail and repairs, transport and storage, and information and communication sectors make up the bulk of the rest of the businesses in the area.

The local shop and café are important assets and there are high hopes that the pub/hotel will open again soon.

SCHOOLS AND EDUCATION

Braco Primary School currently (2023) has 53 pupils in the school and 8 in the Nursery. A new Braco Primary School is planned and is expected to be delivered within the lifetime of this Community Action Plan. Some children in the area also go to Dunblane and primary schools elsewhere. Greenloaning Primary School was permanently closed in 2019.

Secondary school pupils, mainly go to either Crieff, Auchterarder or Dunblane High Schools.

HEALTH AND CARE

Nearest GP surgeries are in Crieff, Dunblane and Auchterarder. Hospital and Acute Services are in Perth, Dundee and Larbert. There is a Cottage Hospital and minor injuries unit in Crieff.

The nearest care homes and sheltered homes are in Muthill, Crieff and Dunblane.

The local church has an invaluable outreach service offering a range of pastoral care including visits for the housebound.

ENVIRONMENT

The surrounding countryside is managed by working farms and estates. Farming is mainly sheep and cattle and grassland. Forestry land use includes amenity woodland as well as more commercial planting (including Christmas trees). The estates also use land for field sports.

The local network of paths includes: Mill Path, Path to Gleneagles Road, 'The Snuff', Castle Tracks, Windmills, Cromlet, Doune Windmills (Cycle Route), Grinnan Hill, Keirallan - Feddal Road Path, River Allan Path, and the River Knaik Path.

Braco Castle Gardens has several woodland walks, as well as amenity ponds and a designed landscaped garden which is open to the public from May - October.

The area is also enhanced by its rivers and burns – Allan Water, River Knaik, Keir Burn, Mill Burn and Feddal Burn.

Ardoch in Bloom maintain and develop many of the green spaces in the community from the crocuses in Braco to the daffodils between Greenloaning and Braco, the tree planting at the New Cemetery, the Keir Burn Picnic area, the restoration of the boundary walls, the planters in Braco and Greenloaning and their continued programme of environmental improvements.

There are several existing windfarms and others in development and some land near the electric sub stations is now being used for battery storage.

HERITAGE

The village of Braco was established in 1815. The Braco Estate came into existence in 1442. It was known then as Brecache from the Gaelic 'spotted field' i.e., 'a field partly cleared of bracken'.

The Ardoch Roman Fort is one of the most important surviving monuments of the Roman Period in Britain and is designated as a Scheduled Monument and of national significance. It was built 2000 years ago and was connected to a line of watchtowers and fortlets across the southern edge of Perthshire. Grinnan Hill in Braco is the site of one of the signaling stations.

Other notable heritage features include: Ardoch Parish Church, Ardoch Free Church Tower, Braco Castle and Gardens, the sites of Fedoch Castle and Ardoch House. Tullibardine Chapel, Ardoch Old Bridge (Knaik Bridge), The Roundel burial mound and other listed buildings in the area.

Other historical claims to fame include:

- The Braco Show which is now over 200 years old and one of the oldest in the country
- The Greenloaning Burns Club founded in 1889
- Greenloaning Railway Station as an example of early railway history
- Being the birthplace of William McGregor the founder of the English Football League.

'Ardoch is one of the most important surviving monuments of the Roman period in Britain and has become an identifiable monument in the national consciousness, and as such has significant value as a field monument. The loss of this example would significantly affect our understanding of the Roman military presence in Scotland. It would also have far-reaching implications for our understanding of the use of forts and temporary camps within the Roman Empire'. (Historic Environment Scotland)

MAIN STRATEGIES & PRIORITIES

These are the main strategies and priorities the community will work towards achieving in partnership with public agencies and other supporters.

THEME 1:

LOCAL ECONOMY AND VILLAGE ENHANCEMENT

The main priority identified is for the local pub/hotel to re-open. It is needed to provide an invaluable social meeting place for residents as well as an attraction for visitors to the area - and to contribute to the local economy. The pub/hotel would add to the existing café and shop which are viewed as essential and requiring ongoing support to flourish.

Village enhancement is seen as required to help bolster the retail and hospitality sector by making Braco more attractive to visitors and locals. People would like to see this include improvements to the appearance and design of Front Street, creation of focal points in Braco and Greenloaning and the provision of more visitor infrastructure (e.g. signage, information, interpretation, parking and Electric Vehicle charging facilities).

There was seen to be an opportunity to boost the economy by making more of the area's environmental, heritage and cultural assets. In particular it was thought that more could be done to develop and promote the local path and cycle network, and that much more could be done to celebrate and promote the Roman heritage.

There was a need identified to develop more business services to support employment, working from home and for existing and new businesses. Childcare, improved broadband, and local workspaces were all thought to be needed to support economic activity.

Main priorities

- Open the local pub/hotel
- Village improvements (appearance, buildings, design)
- Activities, facilities, services and information for visitors
 making the most of the areas environment, heritage and culture
- Support existing businesses and encourage new business
- Business infrastructure and services workspaces, broadband, childcare

THEME 2:

COMMUNITY FACILITIES, ACTIVITIES AND EVENTS

There was a strong desire to see the development and opening of the long promised new primary school — within the lifetime of this Community Action Plan.

It was recognised that this would create a 'knock on' need and opportunity to develop new uses for the village hall and the existing primary school and for the old primary school in Greenloaning.

The Church also plays a strong role in community life in Braco and Greenloaning through the use of its Church Hall, its activities and outreach services. It is seen as important to retain and build on these over the coming years.

It would make sense to look at all these facilities and the activities and services they provide 'in the round' and look at ways of providing good and sustainable facilities that are complementary and work well together.

Many – children and young people in particular – were keen to see better play and outdoor recreation facilities. More play equipment for older children in the Braco Park, better lighting for the MUGA, new goal posts in both the Braco Park and Lodge Park and the potential for a skatepark were all highlighted.

Main priorities:

- Work with Perth & Kinross Council to develop new school
- Future use of existing facilities and services (hall, church, old schools)
- Improve play and outdoor sports activities
- More activities and events
- Support and develop the Church Outreach Programme







THEME 3: ROADS, TRAFFIC, PAVEMENTS, PATHS AND ACTIVE TRAVEL

The Community Council liaise with Perth & Kinross Council to develop traffic calming measures - including reduced speed limits - to make the community a safer place and to make it easier for residents of all ages and abilities to access local services and amenities. Residents are keen to see this good work continued.

In addition to traffic calming and road improvements they have prioritised the need for additional off-road pavements/paths and safe cycle routes — and in particular a safe multi use off road (but near the road) path linking Greenloaning and Braco. They would also like to see the pavement extended out along Feddal Road from Braco to the Keir Picnic Area and for Feddal Road to be made into a walking and cycling friendly road.

Main priorities

- Traffic calming and speed restrictions
- Road improvements
- Off road safe all abilities path linking Braco and Greenloaning and pavement extension in Braco along Feddal Road to the Keir Picnic Area







THEME 4:

ENVIRONMENT AND HERITAGE

People appreciated the existing paths and cycle routes in the area but would also like to see these maintained, developed and promoted more. They saw a local paths and routes network as being important for local people walking and cycling around their community, accessing the surrounding countryside and also extending links out towards neighbouring communities. They thought there was an opportunity to promote this network to attract more visitors to the area.

There was a desire to establish a community garden/ allotments/orchard to encourage and support local growing and which could also serve as a base for Ardoch in Bloom.

Supporting the ongoing work of Ardoch in Bloom was highlighted as a priority. Their work to improve and enhance the area is much appreciated. The importance of local wildlife and biodiversity was also noted, and people were keen to emphasise this in the future.

There was a strong feeling that more should be done to protect, enhance and promote the areas' Roman sites and heritage. More interpretation and opportunities to learn, enjoy and interact with it were wanted.

Main priorities

- Maintaining, developing and promoting the local paths and cycle routes
- Support and develop community allotments/gardens
- Environmental improvements and greenspace and supporting Ardoch in Bloom
- Making the most of local heritage



THEME 5: TRANSPORT AND SERVICES

Braco and Greenloaning residents rely heavily on car use – due to their location, lack of local amenities and services and lack of suitable public transport. It makes living in Braco and Greenloaning difficult for people without cars or for those unable to drive. They found it harder to access health and education services, employment opportunities, amenities, and recreational and leisure facilities.

There were a range of suggestions to improve this including improvements to bus services, having a community minibus or local taxi service, and lobbying once more for the rail station to be opened.

As noted in the local economy theme there was thought to be a need to develop better local childcare options to support working parents and to improve broadband to support remote access.

Main priorities

- Better public and community transport
- Develop local childcare
- Improved Broadband





THEME 6:

LOW CARBON - SUSTAINABILITY AND HOUSING

Previous community initiative to insulate houses, coupled with the fact that houses don't have access to mains gas makes the community ripe for a community initiative to support the use of renewable sources of energy to heat homes as well as community and public buildings.

In general, there was an opportunity for Braco and Greenloaning to cut its carbon usage through a range of initiatives included in this community action plan (use of renewable energy, public transport, electric community minibus, bikes, community allotments, composting, recycling, reuse, services to support working from home, developing active travel routes and paths etc). It would be worth taking stock of all of these — and viewing them 'in the round' - through an initiative to monitor the carbon cutting impact of these measures in the community action plan and for Braco and Greenloaning to be viewed as a 'Carbon Cutting Community.'

There was also a need to look at whether more affordable housing was required to sustain and support local services and amenities. It was highlighted for example that teachers in the local school found it difficult to find affordable housing to purchase locally. In keeping with the thrust of the CAP any affordable housing should also aim to be built with as low a carbon footprint as possible.

Main priorities

- Community initiative to support use of renewable energy in housing and community and public buildings
- Braco and Greenloaning 'Carbon Cutting Community' - encouraging and monitoring carbon cutting initiatives
- Green and affordable housing development that sustains the local economy and services
